As citizens, we share the right to use the road network as a commons. We can all use the roads but are responsible for doing so in many ways that ensure others can also share safer journeys.

CITIZENSHIP and the NZTA primary, secondary and literacy resources.

In education for citizenship we seek deep learning outcomes for “knowing about” and “knowing how to”. SOLO Taxonomy (structure of observed learning outcomes - Biggs and Collis 1982) provides a simple, reliable and robust model for planning learning experiences that shift students from surface to deep learning outcomes.

The NZTA primary, secondary and literacy resources use different learning areas in the New Zealand Curriculum and The Official New Zealand Road Code to explore how and why citizens use the road network in ways that ensure everyone experiences safer journeys.

Each workshop unpacks the use of SOLO in the design of the resources and shares examples of deep student learning. Pam Hook is an experienced consultant in teaching and learning. She is an author, conference presenter and curriculum resource writer.
